

Rosh Hashanah

First and second day of the month of Tishrei

This year: The evening of September 15-17



A special horn called a shofar is blown to signal the start of the New Year.

People greet one another: Shana tova u'metukah - "a good and sweet year"

Did You Know?

- There is a great tradition on the second day of Rosh Hashanah of eating a new fruit of the season.
- Apples, honey, and pomegranates are not the only symbolic foods enjoyed on Rosh Hashanah. Some people eat dates, string beans, beets, pumpkins, leeks - and even fish heads. Sephardic Jews often hold Rosh Hashanah Seders.
- During the Rosh Hashanah holiday, many people observe a fun outdoor tradition called tashlich - Hebrew for "casting off/ throwing off" - where they gather together at a body of flowing water and throw some thing symbolic in the water. Follow this easy **Guide to Tashlich** for your own ceremony.
- · Some people have been known to watch the clock during the t'ki'ah g'dolah (blowing the shofar in one breath) and time how long it lasts.
- · It is customary to wear white on Yom Kippur, and some choose to wear sneakers, not leather shoes.

Yom Kippur

The tenth day of Tishrei

This year: The evening of September 24-25

Yom Kippur is the "Day of Atonement"; it is one of the most solemn days of the Jewish year and is a fast day. It gives us an entire day to focus on our behavior toward other people, the world, our inner-selves, and G-d. We say, "I am sorry" and try to find ways to behave better in the year ahead.

- People greet each other: G'mar tov This is a shortened version of G'mar Chatima tova "A good finishing seal"
- Ketiva v'chatima tova "A good writing and sealing" We are written in the Book of Life on Rosh Hashanah and sealed on Yom Kippur.
- Tzom kal "Have an easy fast"

Sukkot

15- 22 of Tishrei

This year: The evening of Friday, September 29 - Friday October 6, 2023

Sukkot is a week-long celebration of the fall season. It is a little like Thanksgiving, a festival for giving thanks for many things, like food and shelter. The holiday celebrates the farmer's yearly harvest, which takes place in the fall. Sukkot also commemorates the huts in which the Jewish people lived during their years in the desert after they left slavery in Egypt. They wandered for 40 years through the desert. living in temporary shelters/huts. During Sukkot, Jewish families build a temporary little hut or shelter in their yard, called a Sukkah. Families decorate their sukkah with leaves, fruits and vegetables and artwork that kids prepared for the holiday. It is a tradition to eat meals in the sukkah; some people even sleep in the sukkah during the
