The High Holidays just passed and according to the Jewish tradition, it is a time when one looks backwards on what transpired during the year and at the same time, looks ahead to the type of year we wish to cultivate. We learn from our mistakes and work to ensure a brighter tomorrow. It is done on the personal level, but also on the communal level and the national level.

It has been a devastating year for the Jewish people. So much ink has been spilled trying to make sense of October 7th and the subsequent war with Hamas. Today, Israel is under attack from seven countries. 101 hostages are still in Gaza after spending more than a year in captivity, in conditions beyond belief. Families are living with the torment of not knowing if their loved one is still alive. Soldiers are risking their lives to protect the people and land of Israel. It is heartbreaking and there are no words to express our anguish.

Hatikvah, the national anthem of the State of Israel and the Jewish People worldwide, means The Hope. It is the perfect term to describe the Jewish people: we don't say, we are optimistic, but hopeful. Optimism is a term we use when the data suggest that everything should go smoothly, and success is within reach. Hope is used when the odds are against you, but nevertheless, there is a spark that tells you not to give up. We are hopeful that this year, Israel achieve its goals of rescuing the hostages, securing the southern border, bringing the residents of the north back to their homes and destroying the capacity and will of our enemies to attack us. Anyone who has studied Jewish and Israeli history knows that the eternal people always find a way. Ben Gurion was asked during the War of Independence how Israel will survive the onslaught from the Arab armies surrounding the newborn country. He replied - Alef Bet. Those in the room assumed he meant, Artzot Ha'Brit - whose acronym is Alef Bet. No. he corrected them, it is Ain Breirah - "there is no choice". The only option is to prevail, and Israel prevailed against all odds in 1948. And in 2024, there is no other option but to overcome the challenges facing us.

JNF Canada is facing is own challenges and we will not back down. We attempted to engage the CRA in dialogue with no response. We attempted to engage our government to take responsibility for the decisions they delegated to bureaucrats and they declined. Now, we are before the courts standing up for ourselves. There are Canadian organizations that blatantly align themselves with terror organizations and the CRA turns a blind eye. JNF's charitable, life-changing work is evident in every corner of Israel. Thanks to you, our supporters, and those who came before you, we've helped to create a greener, more inclusive, healthier, safer Israel for all of its inhabitants. Ask any of our friends on the ground in Israel and they will tell you that they cannot imagine rebuilding without JNF Canada. That is no gimmick! We are hopeful that the Canadian justice system will provide a just remedy for this unjust situation.

We hope that you enjoy reading this edition of Roots, focusing on the incredible work we were able to achieve during 5874 thanks to you. JNF CANADA IS HERE TO STAY **ISRAEL IS HERE TO STAY** THE JEWISH PEOPLE ARE HERE TO STAY

On August 10, 2024, over Shabbat, we were appalled to learn that our charitable status was revoked. This is likely not news to most of our readers, who have received many emails and communications about this over the past several months. However, we would be remiss to recap our 2023-2024 year without making mention of this unjustified revocation and our ongoing efforts to seek justice.

After a decade of communication and willingness to cooperate with the CRA to their concerns, we appealed their decision to go forward with the revocation on the basis that we had not been subject to a fair process, and the CRA had erred in its findings and conclusions. In a surprising and nearly unprecedented move (based on the review of 200 similar cases), they proceeded with the revocation despite the legal proceedings underway.

We know this is distressing, especially given the political and emotional turmoil of the Jewish community in the last year. We remain resolute and confident that we have a strong case, and we look forward to our day in court to argue it. We thank you, our supporters, from the bottom of our hearts for standing with us.

Background on the CRA audit

The CRA initially audited us in 2014 for work we did in 2011-2012. Since 2014, we have been responsive to all their communications, addressed their concerns where we could, changed our practices, as well as objected to some of their concerns which they later dropped.

We requested a meeting and dialogue to enter into a compliance agreement at least 6 times in writing. None of these requests were answered.

Over the last decade, we've shown our willingness to cooperate and resolve their concerns, but they refused to meet with us. We were never given the opportunity to enter into a compliance agreement, as is the standard practice when the CRA is addressing concerns with charities.

Unjust Process & Reasonable Apprehension of Bias

The CRA's guidelines state that revoking a charity's status should be a last resort. Typically, they start with (1) educational efforts, move on to (2) compliance agreements, and (3) apply sanctions, and (4) revoke a charitable status, only if necessary. However, in our case, no educational steps were taken, and our multiple requests for compliance agreements were ignored. We are bewildered why the first 3 steps were skipped and the CRA went straight to step 4.

It wasn't until 2021, when we received heavily redacted audit documents, that we learned how deeply our detractors were involved in this process. For instance, a key detractor submitted over 100 pages of complaints to the CRA and even had an in-person meeting with the CRA's Director of the Charities Directorate. When JNF Canada requested a meeting (at least 6 times), we were refused.

JNF Canada's Request to the Government

Over the past decade, JNF Canada has tried to engage the CRA in discussions to find a mutually acceptable solution, but they've refused to meet with us.

As a result, we've launched two legal processes:

- An appeal challenging the CRA's decision to revoke our status, arguing they made several legal and factual errors.
- A judicial review requesting the government pause our revocation, and reinstate our charitable status, until the courts rule on the federal appeal.

We are asking the government to:

- Put the revocation on hold, and reinstate our charitable status, until the court process is complete.
- Step in to facilitate a meeting between JNF Canada and the CRA to discuss a possible compliance agreement.





How JNF Jumped into Action after October 7

On the morning of Saturday, October 7, as the news started to reach Canada about the inconceivable attacks that were taking place in Southern Israel, the JNF Canada team contacted each other: "Have you seen the news?" We, like many, knew this would be a harrowing day but we truly could not expect what would unfold in the following hours, days and months.

By Saturday afternoon, we had set up and launched the Israel Resilience Fund. Working with our partners on the ground in Israel, we knew this aid would go towards whatever the embattled communities needed: ambulances, medical equipment, food, temporary shelter, and psychological assistance.

We raised over \$1 million in the first 5 days

Raised over \$6.7 million from over 7000 donors, to date









The First Month

Within a few days, more concrete needs emerged, and over the next few weeks, we directed additional funds to support:

- Clothing, toiletries and family products for 4,000 displaced residents/families across 52 hotels in safe zones
- More than 130 music, sport and art activities for displaced families, to keep children busy and distracted from the realities of their situation
- Existing therapy and counselling projects to continue providing their services remotely, primarily focusing on youth at risk who are now displaced











With the overwhelming support from JNF Canada donors, we also identified and funded specific projects from our partners:

- Donors from the Pacific region led a fundraiser for the Carmel Farm to install a **pre-fabricated bomb** shelter on the horse therapy farm, making it immediately usable for the special needs kids receiving therapy at the farm.
- Individual donors funded the **Food Distribution Center** to ensure the city of Lod could maintain uninterrupted food distribution for the residents who rely on it
- Individual donors funded the renovation of a **bomb shelter in Be'er Sheva** to be usable as soon as residents return

All donations were sent directly to Israel (no administrative holdbacks) and were matched by donors or partners up to 25%.

A thank you to our communities

In the darkest hours, our donors, the Canadian Diaspora, YOU, showed up and showed our families, friends and strangers in Israel that we are here for them. You gave everything you could, and after that, you asked for more ways to help. You volunteered, you canvassed, you shared our campaigns. From the bottom of our hearts, and on behalf of our Israeli partners who saw the support flowing in when they needed it most, thank you.

June 2024 Update

In June 2024, we also launched an Emergency Appeal to support Northern Israel as they battle raging fires across 6,000+ acres, caused by Hezbollah rockets fired form Lebanon. We have raised over \$175K to support the emergency response teams and rehabilitation efforts.



JNF Projects in Action

In the weeks following October 7, we stayed in close contact with our project partners to get updates on how their communities were coping during this unprecedented time. Our existing projects were playing a pivotal role in supporting communities, highlighting that in good times and bad, JNF-funded projects are essential for these communities.

Sheltered Educational Room (B'Nei Netzarim)

This project we funded in 2022 provided protection for B'Nei Netzarim residents, some of whom stayed in the facility for 18 hours until being rescued. The original intent for the project was to provide the community's children a safe place to play and learn during the times when rockets are falling in the region and it is unsafe to travel to the local school. We never imagined that it would be utilized while terrorists rampaged through the Gaza Envelope.



Fidel Youth Club (Be'er Sheva)

A Builder (project donor) was concerned for the kids of the Fidel Youth Club, a project they funded last year. We were all relieved to learn the youth had been evacuated to the north, and their club director was in touch with them every day, providing them continued therapy and support throughout this extremely traumatic and disruptive time. The staff of youth clubs like Fidel are dedicated to their students and are ensured continued support and presence even remotely. Similarly, the Builders who fund JNF projects are deeply invested in the well-being of the kids in their projects.



The Resilience Centre (Sderot)

Sderot Resilience Centre continued to reach Sderot residents who had been evacuated. There are professionals assigned to each patient and they are still supporting and counseling them remotely. We are hearing stories from nurses who are caring for people who are not eating and not sleeping. Mayor Alon Davidi remains one of the few civilians left in Sderot, supporting the emergency squads in addressing the carnage his city faced.



Glassman PTSD and Health Centre at Hertzog Hospital (Jerusalem)

A report from Dr. Yehezkel Caine, Director of the Herzog Medical Hospital: "The hospital currently has 4 teams dispatched, providing PTSD services for evacuees. It is clear to us from previous experience that what we see at the moment doesn't represent the totality of the problem. That will come in another couple of months (or, more precisely, a couple of months after the stress of the war dies down). We are planning to run additional courses to prepare more people to deal with the next phase... So, that is the picture at the end of the fourth week of the war. Unfortunately, it's clear this is going to be a very long haul so we have to plan for the long term.



Western Canada House Shelter (Rishon L'Tzion)

The shelter opened its doors the week after October 7 (earlier than expected due to the urgent needs). The shelter is a safe house for women and children escaping domestic violence and abuse at home. Although normally it can take months to obtain final occupancy permits, we heard in mid-October from the shelter's director that the process was expedited to ensure these women and children were protected during this increasingly vulnerable time. JNF Canada funded this project in collaboration with No2Violence, thanks to the generous support of the JNF Manitoba/Saskatchewan and Pacific regions.



The Lavi Field and Forest Centre, normally used as a sleepover educational center for students, has become home to many of the evacuated residents. Here, families each have their own secure cabin and are being cared for with warm meals, counseling services, kids' education and activities, and quiet nature. We heard from one of the coordinators that families who lost a family member are not able to be apart from each other, doing all activities side by side and unable to leave each other, even to go to the bathroom.



JNF Canada Solidarity Missions: Bearing Witness and Offering Hope

Since October 7, JNF Canada has conducted six volunteer and solidarity missions to Israel, providing donors a unique chance to give back after the tragic events of that day. These missions have united people from across Canada with Israel during this challenging time.

In Israel, participants observed the quietness of normally busy places and the resilience of the people. Visiting affected locations like Kibbutz Kissufim, Kibbutz Re'im, and the Nova Festival site, witnessing devastation and survival stories.

At Adi Negev-Nahalat Eran, a village for people with disabilities, participants volunteered in therapeutic farming and animal therapy.

In Sderot, the groups saw the aftermath of Hamas attacks and the impact of JNF Canada's partnerships. They saw the remains of the police station overtaken by Hamas and destroyed by an Israeli tank.

Some missions included a visit to Hostages Square for Kabbalat Shabbat, where participants felt welcomed and joined locals in dancing. In Shlomit, Dana, a mother of six, shared her story of loss and hope.

In Jerusalem, they toured the Jerusalem Hills Therapeutic Center for girls at risk and the Glassman PTSD Hospital. A participant summed up, "These missions show the people of Israel they are not alone."

JNF Canada's missions are a testament to volunteer and donor support, bearing witness to the horrors faced by Israelis and offering hope. JNF Canada invites others to join upcoming missions.






Reflections from Mission Participants

Re-calibrating our strategy to meet Israel's greatest needs

The October 7 attacks and the subsequent war wreaked havoc on the communities in Israel's Southern and Northern regions. Various estimates put the cost of reconstruction in the tens of billions of dollars. Israel is facing challenges in a variety of areas including: health (mental health and physical rehabilitation), education, social services, housing, employment, security, and more.

Over the next 2-3 years, JNF Canada expects to raise \$20M-\$30M towards the rebuilding efforts. The Resilience Task Force was formed to develop a plan to maximize the impact of our donations over the next 2-3 years. The focus is on maximizing the number of people/families that we will touch, with high impact, transformative results. Our contributions will fill much-needed gaps in Israeli communities. When we look back on our decisions years from now, we will be able to proudly state that JNF Canada help build what the country needed most, in the dark aftermath of Oct 7 and the years that followed.

The Task Force first heard from experts via Zoom sessions, on the impacts of Oct 7 on the Israeli psyche, mental health, security, and socio-economic issues. The Task Force travelled to Israel in July 2024, where they met with officials, experts, hostages, kibbutz inhabitants, displaced residents, and medical professionals to understand the diverse needs of the country in and after war.

It was a challenging visit, as the needs are so great. The task force was profoundly moved by the strength of Israel's healthcare professionals, the hostages and their families, the brave reservists, the displaced families, and everyday civilians, all of whom are keeping the social and welfare fabric of Israel alive in her hardest chapter.

The Resilience Strategy is currently in development and expected to be implemented in early 2025.

Helping Israelis Heal

JNF Canada has been building Israeli resilience for decades. Many of our projects played an important role in supporting Israel's citizens in the immediate aftermath of October 7.

Phase 1 of the Sderot Resilience Centre

Sderot is a developing community less than a mile from the Gaza border, with a population expected to reach 50,000 soon. As the city grows, the demand for mental health services increases. Residents face ongoing security threats, leading to widespread anxiety, depression, PTSD, insomnia, and other emotional challenges.

To help residents cope, the Resilience Center, established in 2008, offers free emotional therapy and community programs, acting as an "emergency room" for trauma victims. Parents also require guidance as their children grow. To address these needs, Sderot is building a new Resilience Complex, which will include a Parenthood Home for family therapy and a PTSD Research and Convention Center to enhance community resilience and research trauma.



JNF Pacific supported this project.

Bomb Shelter for Carmel Horse Therapy Farm

The Carmel Horse Therapy Farm serves hundreds of youths with emotional problems, anxiety, social integration difficulties, post-trauma, etc. The horse farm also employs adults with special needs, serving Haifa's special needs community.

JNF Pacific launched an urgent appeal after learning that their Negev project, the Carmel Farm, did not have a bomb shelter. As a result, all therapy had to stop following October 7 and the special-needs youth at the farm could not continue their therapies and progress. Within a week, the Pacific community came together and fundraised enough for a prefabricated shelter so that the farm could reopen and the youth were able to continue their life-improving therapy during this crisis time without interruption.



The Parenthood Home at the Resilience Centre in Sderot

In Sderot, over 700 rockets fall annually. 80% of children suffer from PTSD. The Resilience Centre, a flagship project for JNF Canada and Sderot's municipality, strengthens the community by offering therapy, emotional support, a 24/7 hotline, courses for parents, emergency services, and more.

Thanks to JNF Builders and JNF regional fundraising, the new Resilience Centre was renovated with a bomb shelter, and expanded facilities, doubling the number of patients it can serve. Phase 2 of the Centre, The Parenthood Home for Family Therapy, is now under construction. It will offer therapy and guidance to help families cope with the traumas of October 7 and the months that followed. It will also house a PTSD Research Centre, conducting trauma research and providing workshops on community resilience.

Family Therapy Centre at the in Ofakim

On October 7, the small city of Ofakim was heavily attacked by terrorists. Residents and police, armed with knives, a few handguns, and eventually the terrorists' rifles, managed to stop them, but 48 people, including 18 defenders, were lost. Many residents were called to fight, and others evacuated to temporary shelters. Those remaining described Ofakim as a ghost town, with half the residents gone and the rest afraid to leave their homes.

The Family Therapy Centre housed in the Community Centre will support the recovery of the devastated town. It will feature a large hall and smaller rooms for family services including counseling, financial planning, and various other treatments. This Centre will be a crucial resource for the community as they heal from their traumatic experiences.

Kibbutz Kissufim Youth Club

At the youth centre, Kissufim's youth will have a space to come together and process the tragic events that unfolded in their community. Two of the nineteen youth, Noya Dan (12) and Sagie Zak (15), were murdered by Hamas. The club's primary focus will be to provide essential mental and social support to the group as they navigate the profound impact of the loss of their friends. The centre will provide trained counselling, and an after-school space for homework and activities. The renovation will comprise of several spaces, a fortified shelter and two private therapy rooms, and is expected to be completed and ready for residents when they return.

Woman's Empowerment and Entrepreneurship Centre in Yerucham

The "She Work" Centre for Entrepreneurship and Empowerment in Yerucham will offer an intensive 15-month program for budding entrepreneurs, workspace, ongoing business mentorship and workshops, and large expo networking events. Key program objectives are to strengthen economic and social resilience, allow women in destructive relationships to cultivate economic independence, and build an urban women's professional network for mutual empowerment. After the building renovation is complete, the Centre's program will service 45 female entrepreneurs a year.

Women's Training and Empowerment Centre in Lod

100% Funded

In the city of Lod, most families are Ethiopian, have language and cultural gaps, and struggle to integrate into the employment market and society. JNF is partnering to support the Education and Society in Lod Association, who have provided professional training and employment support to empower these families for more than a decade. The Association recently purchased a building from one of the city's residents, a Holocaust survivor who deeply supported their mission and activities. With JNF, they plan to build a Women's Training & Empowerment Center to provide computer classes, Hebrew lessons, fiscal planning support, family aid, education for children and youth, and traditional Ethiopian cultural activities. The center will serve 100 families in its first year, and 500 by its third year.

The Ethiopian Women's Empowerment Centre

The Shaalim organization has received a piece of land to construct the Ethiopian Women's Empowerment Centre to serve the Ethiopian women of the community in Beit Shemesh. Since October 7, the Centre has also expanded to provide war-time services to help the community navigate new and changing instructions from the government and army, and how to apply for help, insurances, and other urgent services. The new Centre will consist of vocational training, computer & communication support, a parent and family centre, and a centre for the heritage and culture of Ethiopian Jews.

Climate Solutions Prize



JNF Quebec Champions Climate Solutions Prize and Celebrates Success at COP28

JNF Quebec proudly supports the Climate Solutions Prize, fostering groundbreaking climate research in Israel and Quebec. This year, the prestigious \$1 million prize will be awarded in Israel to the most innovative researchers addressing the climate crisis. Additionally, \$250,000 was awarded locally in Quebec through the Climate Solutions Festival, fostering partnerships between our two countries.



Success at COP28 in Dubai

The United Nations Climate Change conference, COP28, concluded with a historic agreement to transition away from fossil fuels, triple renewable energy, and increase climate finance for the most vulnerable. These resolutions mark a significant step forward, but much work remains to address the growing climate crisis.

The Climate Solutions Prize (CSP)/JNF Canada team actively participated and hosted several panels at COP28. Highlights included discussions in the Green Zone on "Supporting Scale" with partners like the Tamasek Foundation and Continental AG. In the Blue Zone at the Israel Pavilion, the 2023 Israeli Climate Solutions Prize Finalists were announced. Collaborative efforts with the Canadian Clean Resource Innovation Network, Amazon Web Services, Cycle Momentum, and Novarium focused on "How Philanthropy Can Propel Climate Tech Innovation," spotlighting the crucial role of CSP.

With over 1,200 participants, 67 speakers, and \$1M in prizes awarded, the Climate Solutions Festival at the Grand Quay in Montreal's Old Port was action-packed. Advancing JNF Education Across Canada: A Year of Resilience and Growth

The past year has been marked by significant challenges in the aftermath of the tragic events of October 7th. However, these difficulties have only reinforced the importance of our mission in education. JNF Canada has remained steadfast in its commitment to nurturing a strong Jewish identity and fostering loyalty to Israel. Throughout the year, our educational initiatives reached a broad audience, including students, families, teenagers, and educators across Canada.



This year, JNF Canada deepened its focus on core values and Israel education. Developing activities for holidays like Hanukkah, Tu Bi'Shevat, and the "Yamim," tailored for Jewish day schools, supplementary schools, youth movements, synagogues, JCCs, and communities across Canada.

Transformative Educators' Mission to Israel

In July 2023, thirty educators from across Canada embarked on a mission to Israel, exploring environmental, educational, and Zionist initiatives. They gained insights into pioneering methods, sustainable projects, and Israel's rich history and culture, inspiring them to integrate these themes into their teaching.

Community Engagement During High Holidays

From September to November 2023, JNF Canada participated in events for the High Holidays, in cooperation with the Hostage and Missing Families Forum. Activities included meetings with hostages' families and support events like Kites for Hope, fostering communal support and resilience.









Illuminating Hanukkah and Winter Camps

In December 2023, JNF Canada launched Hanukkah activities for Jewish day schools and campers, focusing on the lights and miracles of Israel. Workshops and outdoor activities helped students connect with Israel's cultural and natural heritage, deepening their appreciation for the holiday.



In December 2023, JNF Canada offered workshops for educators, emphasizing experiential learning and innovative teaching. The first PD Day focused on Tu Bi'Shevat and wildfires, while the second used the Hackathon framework to foster creative learning and teamwork.



In January 2024, JNF Canada organized a virtual hackathon for 150 students from nine schools. Students explored David Ben-Gurion's vision of an "exemplary society," engaging in creative projects that strengthened their connection with Israel and inspired community improvement initiatives.

Celebrating Tu Bi'Shevat with a Global Perspective

Between January and February 2024, JNF Canada's Tu Bi'Shevat programs reached over 3,000 participants across Canada. The "JNF Caravan" brought young Israelis to communities, promoting environmental stewardship and a deeper connection to Israel through various activities.
